Such is the case with Betty Baird and our current Alpha Upsilon president, Barb Summers. Betty taught Home Economics to Barb during Barb's entire high school career at Valley, grades 9 through 12. Barb remembers Miss Baird as a kind, enthusiastic teacher who encouraged students to expand themselves and try new things. Because of her experiences in her class, Barb went on to college, studied Home Economics and taught the subject at Highlands for many years. For this reason, and others, Betty Baird, has been chosen this issue's Alpha Upsilon Profile.

Betty grew up in Bagdad and Leechburg, where she spent time with her Aunt Twila in the summers. This aunt taught Betty how to bake and suggested Home Economics would be a good major in college. Betty agreed and so, after graduating from Leechburg High School, she attended Muskingham College for one year, then transferred to and finished her degree at Indiana State Teachers College.



Betty taught first in Blairsville where she started the first school lunch program at the high school. She would make soup each morning and then students would come in and make sandwiches which would be served with the soup. The principal would come hand help wash the trays after lunch.

Betty then moved closer to home, teaching first in Highlands, then at Valley where she finished her career.

Throughout the years, Betty enjoyed coming to Delta Kappa Gamma meetings with her sister, Agnes Tidd and later also with her niece, Mary Beth Yeamens, who is still a member. Family was very important to Betty and spent many happy hours with them, especially shopping at Brody's in Indiana and Kaufmann's in Monroeville.

Currently, Betty is living at Corcordia in Cabot and will be celebrating her 99th birthday this year on October 17th. Happy Birthday, Betty!
